

Harvey Pioneer's Dwelling Reproduced



With the Union Jack flying bravely as an indication that British spirit, pluck and loyalty is as great in the Harvey community to-day as it was a century ago, when the pioneers hewed out their homes in the forest, the reproduction of a settler's log cabin, shown above, stands near the lake at Harvey Station. The photograph taken during yesterday's proceedings which officially and formally opened the observation of the centennial, shows the Rt. Hon. Countess of Ashburnham of Fredericton entering. Two residents are seated upon the bench at the left of the doorway. Allowing for changes in materials, the structure gives to the onlooker an excellent visual impression of the first dwellings of the pioneers.
